The Canadian Open is a 3-day feature event of the Edmonton Heritage Festival, which alone attracts 300,000 visitors to experience over 50 different cultures that are show cased through clothing, song, dance, artifacts, food and drink. Also occurring in Edmonton at the same time of the festival and the takraw event is the World Track and Field Championships. The Canadian Open is an event to decide which Canadian team will hold the national title for Canada. There are four including: Girls, under 19; Boys, under 19: Women's: and Men's. Last year, a Canadian team from Winning won the national title; and a guest team from Minnesota, representing Team USA, won the all around competition.
